Providing people with knowledge and opportunity.

The North Carolina AHEC Scholars Program at Northwest AHEC had a year of phenomenal local and statewide programming with students from Salem College, Wake Forest University (WFU) and Winston-Salem State University (WSSU). These scholars participated in 40 hours of local and statewide didactic modules. New this year, the statewide didactic modules were presented in person over an engaging weekend in collaboration with High Point University.

The annual Fall Leadership and Regional Conferences were held for Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) members of the Northwest Regional and Piedmont-Triad Regional Chapters of North Carolina. HOSA chapters also supported our Camp Med program with an introductory video and statewide promotion.

Wake Forest University School of Medicine medical students in partnership with Northwest AHEC held the annual Share the Health Fair (STHF) at the Downtown Health Plaza. The event provided no-cost screenings and services to underserved populations in the Winston-Salem community. STHF saw an estimated 300+ fair attendees.

The School of Medicine Chapter of the American Medical Women's Association partnered with Northwest AHEC to host 80 high school juniors and seniors from area schools. NC Scholars were also invited to The Salem College Health Leadership Forum for discussions on current trends while hearing from some of the nation's most widely recognized experts and innovators. Plus, Northwest AHEC nursing staff collaborated for Innovation Days at Salem Academy, allowing 20+ high school women to experience challenging simulations and critical-thinking activities.

Northwest AHEC partnered with the WSSU Foundation in sponsoring the WSSU Run and Walk 5K/10K and Fun Run event in March. The focus of this event was about coming together as a community to make a positive impact on the health and wellness of our students and neighbors.

In April we helped fifth graders at Oldtown Elementary be doctors for the day. Students enjoyed learning about the profession, interviewing patients and discussing possible solutions to health care issues.

NC Health Talent Alliance

The NC Health Talent Alliance is a statewide talent solution to aggressively address the state's critical health care talent shortages. The Regional TPM Manager works directly with employers, education providers and community partners to align all aspects of the health care talent pipeline around solving data-driven workforce issues. This is an exciting new endeavor for NC AHEC, NC Chamber Foundation, NC Center on the Workforce for Health and the State of North Carolina. Regional accomplishments to date include:

- Deployed an informational newsletter with an introduction to Talent Pipeline Management (TPM), a talent demand survey and invitation to virtual information sessions, reaching 4,000+ stakeholders.
- Information sessions attended by various health care providers across the region.
- Met with local chambers of commerce to establish relationships to better strengthen solutions to help close the health care talent gap.
- Kicked off the first Collaborative Group, a meeting that included a review of TPM methodology, collaborative commitment information and a brief overview of statewide/regional data results.
- Continuous recruitment of more health care employers to participate in monthly collaborative meetings.
- Engaging with regional education partners to establish relationships and include them in the next steps of the TPM process.

Diversity, Equity & Inclusion

Since Northwest AHEC began 50 years ago, we have concentrated on recruiting, training and retaining health care professionals who reflect the communities they serve. In Academic Year 2024 (AY24), we continued to conduct activities and develop resources to inform, support and nurture Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. 

Student Services



Creating connections between students and communities.

Northwest AHEC helps coordinate with each affiliated university to secure housing for students during rotations. Making housing available to students helps reduce their expenses while engaging in community-based education activities. This invaluable experience is vital for training and retaining future health care practitioners in communities where they are needed most.

In April of 2024, Northwest AHEC made the important decision to move forward with single occupancy bedrooms for students.

Single bedrooms allow students to have private, personal space while they are already sharing the housing with other students. Students will be more comfortable having their own space without concerns of sharing a bedroom or worrying if their sleep and study habits will be compatible with others. The goal is to provide all students with a better environment for studying and preparing assignments for a superior clinical experience.


Housing students more nights

Housing numbers from Academic Year 2024 reveal that students stayed 14% more nights versus AY23, despite overall nights provided and students housed decreasing. North Carolina A&T University joined the affiliation, bringing the number of schools to 20.

Graduate Medical Education and Patient Services Support



Firsthand experience in making a difference.

Through its educational programs, Northwest AHEC helps residents and medical students recognize and best meet the needs of people in our communities who are uninsured, underinsured and underserved. Our support of graduate medical education helps create training and retention opportunities to keep health care professionals thoughtfully and expertly serving diverse communities of people everywhere in North Carolina today, tomorrow and always.

This core service provides training in under-resourced communities and treatment of vulnerable populations. Examples of these AY24 community-based rotation initiatives included:

FAMILY AND COMMUNITY MEDICINE

- OB rotation at the Stokes County Health Department providing prenatal care in a rural community.
- Providing general outpatient care at the Bethesda Center for the homeless population.
- Elective rotation providing outpatient medical and behavioral health care to underserved patients at the Highland Avenue clinic.
- Providing obstetrical, gynecological and general care at four Federally Qualified Health Centers and surrounding communities.
- Providing care to Winston-Salem State University student-athletes during sports medicine rotations.
- Refugee clinic at United Health Center, Peters Creek, where residents assist a family medicine faculty member in providing care to the area's Syrian refugee population.
- School-based health alliance allowing residents to deliver care in Title 1 schools.
- The Community Care Clinic (Centro Clinico) where residents provide general care to an underserved and mainly Latino population.
- Providing care at Dragonfly House, a clinic for pediatric victims of abuse.
- Providing obstetrical care in a rural practice in Wilkesboro.
- Providing medical care for students at the UNC School of the Arts.
- Application of Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) resources and information into regular patient care, including population health and value-based care, along with routine screening of patients for SDOH.

INTERNAL MEDICINE

- Residents rotate at the VA Clinic in Kernersville, Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center and University Internal Medicine.
- Residents and faculty provide continuity clinics and urgent care visits for underserved populations in Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist's Downtown Health Plaza (DHP) and other outpatient departments.

- Strategically located in a health care manpower shortage area, the DHP has a unique attachment to the underserved east Winston-Salem community.
- Through three large clinics (Pediatrics, Adult Medicine and Ob/Gyn), more than 25,000 patients offered primary care, acute care and post hospital services.
- The DHP patient population has a Medicaid enrollment of 15,109 (August 2018) and an aged, blind and/or disabled cohort of 3,361 — the largest of any N.C. Medicaid site.
- Integrated behavioral health, counseling, legal and food pantry services, and a community garden are available to families served by the DHP.
- Ongoing collaboration with the Northwest Community Care Network provides on-site case managers to patients in pediatrics and internal medicine.
- Some residents on elective months choose to rotate at the Community Care Clinic.


PSYCHIATRY AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

- Tele-Psychiatry Services are available to provide behavioral health services to hospitals in underserved areas in Lexington as well as Wilkes and Davie counties.
- Opioid group therapy and treatment are offered through Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist Behavioral Health.
- Behavioral health consultations are provided through a specialized outpatient clinic at the Downtown Health Plaza.
- School Health Alliance, Crossnore School and Children's Home in Winston-Salem allow fellows to provide psychiatric care to elementary and middle school-aged students, as well as services to children living in the Children's Home.
- The Children's Law Center in Winston-Salem provides fellows with forensic experience in the family court system.
- University-Based Student Health provides psychiatric care to young adults in a university setting.

- Funded through the United Way, Child & Adolescent Psychiatry provides behavioral health services to indigent children.
- The academic program delivered lectures on Social Determinants of Health and Mental Health Equity.

PEDIATRICS

- Pediatric residents and medical students have been involved in projects relating to the Forsyth Refugee Health Collaborative, including advocacy, quality improvement initiatives, research, and efforts to expand the initiative to meet emerging needs.
- The projects are related to the Health Equity and Global Health certificate programs of the Wake Forest University School of Medicine designed to provide health equity education and training in addressing local and global health needs for residents and medical students.
- Work with refugees is part of a partnership between several medical practices, the Forsyth County Dept. of Public Health, the refugee resettlement agency (World Relief), and other community partners. Residents rotate to a twice-monthly clinic at the Community Care Center for uninsured, immigrant adolescents.
- The DHP evaluates newly arrived immigrant children from under-resourced settings, offers expanded resources for legal referrals, conducts refugee health assessments for children, and has a medical-legal partnership available for immigrant patients who are victims of human trafficking or domestic violence.
- The DHP screens children for SDOH, including determining assistance for food insecurity, transportation, basic needs, legal assistance, housing, caregiver depression or substance use.
- On-site and co-located specialists and programs are available through the DHP, Imprint Cares, Inc., and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).
- Integrated behavioral health providers within the DHP assist residents in learning how to screen, diagnose and manage behavioral health disorders.
- The DHP has been certified by the National Committee for Quality Assurance as a Level 3 Patient-Centered Medical Home.




Northwest AHEC offered continuing professional development opportunities with even more professional topics. ENHANCING HEALTH CARE EDUCATION THROUGH INTERPROFESSIONAL COLLABORATION

The interprofessional collaboration between Winston-Salem State University's (WSSU) School of Health Sciences and Wake Forest University School of Medicine Department of PA Studies added a new partner in 2024.

Forsyth Technical Community College nursing students have joined the partnership through Northwest AHEC. This allowed for over 300 students and 30 faculty facilitators to come together in person to discuss and collaborate on a patient case so that students could better understand how interprofessional teams can best approach patient care.

The event focused on enhancing existing curricula by adding a case-based educational experience at both institutions. The experience involved the integration of an escape room built by the Wake Forest University Instructional Design team, along with other activities to help foster discussion and communication. The students worked together to manage a simulated patient's care as well as understand the roles and responsibilities of each discipline member on their team. Students also focused on addressing social determinants of health and how health equity plays a role in the patient's care.

5[™] ANNUAL WINSTON-SALEM DANCE MEDICINE CONFERENCE

The Winston-Salem Dance Medicine Conference took place in November 2023 at the Bowman Gray Center for Medical Education in Winston-Salem, attracting a diverse audience of 90 attendees from across North Carolina and 18 other states. The in-person gathering focused on the core principles of dance medicine, sparking enlightening conversations about the crucial role of biomechanics and the importance of a multidisciplinary approach to care.

The conference is an educational opportunity for physicians, allied health professionals, dancers, dance instructors, and students to review (or learn anew) the fundamentals of dance medicine, including unique biomechanics, genre-specific considerations, and social/psychological demands that may influence performance and injury risk.

Attendees enjoyed demonstrations from breakdancing, ballroom, and contemporary dance genres. The keynote speaker, Ashley Bouder, contributed a wealth of knowledge and passion to the conference, sharing her extensive experience as a principal dancer at the New York City Ballet. Also, as the founder and artistic director of the Ashley Bouder Project, an arts collaborative dedicated to promoting gender equality, diversity, and inclusion in the dance world, her presence added a valuable perspective on the importance of creative leadership roles.

38[™] ANNUAL RESPIRATORY CARE CONFERENCE

The 38th Northwest AHEC Annual Respiratory Care Conference was held in February 2024, and saw a record turnout of 122 attendees. The diverse crowd represented six different states and included representation from 49 North Carolina counties.

Since 1986, the Annual Respiratory Care Conference has provided a larger perspective on patient care concerns through continuing education sessions representing all levels of expertise in the field.

Topics for the 2024 conference included: COPD: Changes in GOLD Standards; Advanced Practice RT In Transport Environment; Interstitial Lung Disease (ILD); Treatment of PE; Lung Transplants; Modes of Ventilation; RCP License Renewals and NBRC Credentialing Requirements: What I Need Know in North Carolina; Personalizing Pharmacotherapy in COPD: Why Device Selection Matters; among a variety of other topics.

PREVENTING PROVIDER BURNOUT: A REFRESHING RETREAT RECAP

For the first time in five years, health care professionals gathered in downtown Winston-Salem at the Brookstown Inn to kick off a two-day retreat, guiding participants through a rejuvenating wellness activity by the esteemed director of Arts and Wellness at the Sawtooth Center.

Presenters offered learning activities designed to help health care professionals recognize signs of languishing and burnout, cultivate strategies for well-being, and build a toolbox with stress management techniques. Attendees included nurses, mental health providers, educators, physicians, social workers, health educators and other professionals interested in burnout prevention.

REVAMPED LACTATION EDUCATOR TRAINING PROGRAM

At the beginning of January, Northwest AHEC launched the 2024 North Carolina Lactation Educator Training Program, a longstanding initiative dating back to 1996.

The program received a complete refresh with the goal to make the course more accessible across the state for health care professionals and to meet the growing needs of the breastfeeding community. In the past, participants had to attend multiple in-person days of didactic education with a clinical component. Now, participants who register for the program complete an online, self-paced course focused on many different topics such as the basics of breastfeeding, assessment, counseling and communication, positioning, common problems, returning to the workplace, and multicultural perspectives.

Following the completion of the online course, participants attended a four-hour in-person Skills Day session to apply the information and principles from the online course. The online course was developed by: Georganna Cogburn, MSHE, RD, LDN, IBCLC, RLC; Sheila Britt-Smith, M.Ed., RD, IBCLC; and Alana Dodson, MBA, BSN, RN. We are looking forward to offering this again this fall.

NCNA ANNUAL CONVENTION

Northwest AHEC Nurse Educators, Alana Dodson, MBA, RN and Stephanie Yoder, MSN, attended the North Carolina Nurse's Association (NCNA) Annual Convention in September in Winston-Salem. They were able to participate in presentations on Innovation and Redesigning Health Care, Defining Nursing Leadership, Responding to Workplace Violence, and Taking Action to Promote Health Equity and Nurse Wellbeing with around 500 other nurses from across the state. Community leaders held an engaging panel discussing the action that health care institutions and state legislators are taking to advocate for safety for health care workers. This event allowed our Nurse Educators to feel inspired and motivated, and they enjoyed contributing their voices to the future of the nursing profession.




UNC Chapel Hill School of Nursing RN Refresher Program

From April 1, 2023, to March 31. 2024. 63 nurses graduated from the RN Refresher program (18 of whom were from the Northwest AHEC region). As of March 31, 2024. 34 were working as nurses and 14 were looking for nursing positions. Out of all total graduates (not lost to follow up) 94% are either working in or looking for a nursing position.



Practice Support Services



Reinforcing excellence in practices across our region.

Northwest AHEC strengthened its commitment to providing activities and coaching to meet the ongoing and evolving needs of providers throughout the region. The number of coaching encounters in Academic Year 2024 continued to rise (2,727 vs. 2,695 in AY23), covering 25 different topics. More practices are turning to Northwest AHEC to help improve health outcomes and reduce the cost of care in their communities, thanks, in large part, to online modules and in-person, one-on-one practice support coaching relationships.

COLLABORATING FOR COMMUNITY HEALTH: NW AHEC'S RURAL HEALTH CENTER VISITS

Northwest AHEC and the Office of Rural Health (ORH) partnered for three site visits to State Designated Rural Health Centers (SDRHC). Our partnership with SDRHC and ORH ensures top-notch primary health care for all residents in their communities. Through the work of Medina Wilson, MBA, CPC, CPPM, CFD, Senior Quality Improvement Specialist at Northwest AHEC, we have initiated discussions with ORH and Grace Clinic in Elkin, Surry Medical Ministries in Mount Airy and Hugh Chatham Health to cover a range of topics including clinical data review, conducting needs assessments, planning strategies, and organizing upcoming events.

ONLINE TRAINING MODULES GAIN TRACTION

In response to a need expressed by several practices in our region, Practice Support (Lara Dickerson, MHA, BA, Senior Quality Improvement Specialist and Leslie McDowell, DNP, ANP-BC, RN, Quality improvement Specialist at Northwest AHEC) created an on-demand learning module entitled, "Managing Difficult Patient Situations". The module has garnered 450 registered learners since its release in January. It was also incorporated into a Workplace Safety Toolkit produced by the American Academy of Ambulatory Care Nurses for its membership in June, and now reaches a national audience of nurse leaders and educators.

Leslie McDowell with Practice Support also collaborated with leaders within the Wake Forest University School of Medicine Internal Medicine Residency clinics to create an online module on best practices and workflows for when an interpreter is needed for a telehealth visit. The module is now a mandatory part of third-year medical student Health Equity curriculum, and in December 2023, was published in the MedEdPORTAL.

NORTHWEST AHEC AWARDED NC MEDICAID GRANT

The Northwest AHEC Practice Support Team was awarded a grant from NC Medicaid supporting five different online self-paced learning activities. Developed in collaboration with the continuing professional development team, these modules focus on screening and intervening for unmet social needs, and reverse behavioral health integration. By using the steps and tools included in the different modules, clinical and behavioral health team members can implement new evidence-based workflows and care delivery strategies to serve their patients and clients. These modules are free to take, all include credit hours, and can be completed through self-paced online learning.

Two Northwest AHEC-Supported Practices Win Excellence Awards

Congratulations to Grace Clinic of Yadkin Valley and Surry Medical Ministries for their recent acceptance of State Designated Rural Health Centers (SDRHC) of Excellence Awards.

Grace Clinic of Yadkin Valley was named SDRHC of the Year for excellence in using local resources and collaborating with other partners to respond to health care gaps in their community, as well as innovative strategies to promote health equity and inclusion.

Surry Medical Ministries was honored for Excellence in Behavioral Health Plan Management. The organization demonstrated excellence in blending behavioral health services fully or partially within the primary care practice.

Web Activity: Site, Blog, Email and Social Media

The goal of technology is to make it easier to reach, engage, train and retain more health care professionals. We continue to enhance online resources, our Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system, and other tools and insight to refine and focus Northwest AHEC's online marketing and content for a more targeted, relevant and efficient experience.

Web traffic and engagement have exceeded many of our program goals, effectively meeting learners where they are and strengthening their knowledge in helping their communities have greater access to quality care.

ONLINE LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

143 courses 5,581

Total emails sent: 968,655 Social media follower growth: +6.41%

- Our email campaign tools allow us to keep refining our marketing communication, targeting 348 email campaigns for 968,655 emails.
- Click-through rates on emails (when a recipient opens an email and clicks a link) rose to 16.4% in AY24 (from ~14% in AY23).
- The lower number of online courses and enrollments suggests a move to more in-person activities as we move beyond the COVID virtual years.
- Although there were fewer courses, there were more enrollments per course, averaging 39 learners per course this year versus 29 last year.
- Engagement rate jumped significantly (meaning learners opened at least one email, viewed a webpage in the last 60 days or registered for an activity). Of the 76,252 contacts in our CRM database, 47,772 have engaged with Northwest AHEC for an engagement rate of 63%.
- Social media followers grew nearly 6.5% from AY23, finishing AY24 with 2,739 total followers across all channels.
- Email and social media campaigns together led directly to 14.3% of Northwest AHEC website traffic.
- Direct traffic continues to be our main channel for website sessions followed by organic search, referrals and email marketing traffic.
- The Northwest AHEC blog continues to drive additional website traffic. The blog attracted 11,829 total views in AY24, including 4,380 practice support update page views. The blog is available at nwahec.org/blog.
- Our Healthcare Insights Podcast on Soundcloud garnered 2,365 plays in AY24, with 63 people enrolled in the Podcast Learning Series since the beginning of 2024. The podcast is available at soundcloud.com/nwahecwebmaster.






FUNDING SOURCES AND EXPENDITURES
